

Student Alumni Association Gift To Tech Funds Twelve Recycling Centers

This summer, there are twelve new recycling centers on campus. Thanks to a generous donation by Georgia Tech's Student Alumni Association (SAA), brand new recycling centers have been installed in five campus buildings. There are four at Howey Physics, four at the Instructional Center, one at the ISyE Annex, one at Groseclose, and two at the Clough Undergraduate



Learning Center. These buildings were chosen because they are heavily used by students, although the recycling centers will benefit the entire campus community.

Each of the recycling centers has five interconnected bins. The bins have been configured so that there are two compartments for plastic bottles and containers, one for aluminum cans, one for mixed paper, and one for landfill trash. A signboard mounted to the back of the bins puts signage at eye level. The twelve recycling centers are easily identifiable and are marked "Sponsored by Student Alumni Association."

The new containers were purchased with funds from SAA's Gift To Tech. The OSWM&R was the recipient of SAA's first annual Gift To Tech. SAA members raised over \$20,000 and voted to donate the funds to the campus recycling program.

Game Day Recycling Program Preps for 5th Season

When football season kicks off this fall, fans at Georgia Tech's home games will be greeted by the familiar sight of volunteers in bright green T-shirts encouraging them to recycle their bottles and cans. Blue recycling bags will be given out to tailgaters and there will be recycling bins set up in and around Bobby Dodd Stadium.

2012 marks the fifth season for Georgia Tech's Game Day Recycling program. The program began in 2008, and each year it expands to reach more fans and divert additional materials from the landfill. This season the focus is on collecting the cardboard that is generated by vendors inside the stadium and cutting down on contamination by more effectively communicating with fans about what is/isn't recyclable on game days.

The Game Day Recycling committee is meeting throughout the summer. Students, faculty, and staff are welcome to participate. If you would like to get involved, please join us at one of the upcoming meetings.



Georgia Tech Waste Diversion Statistics

The chart below shows Georgia Tech's mixed office paper recycling statistics for January – June, 2012. Mixed office paper is collected on Wednesdays. The large spike in May was due to student move-out at the end of spring semester. Overall, Georgia Tech averages 5.1 tons of office paper recycling per week.

Georgia Tech Mixed Office Paper Recycling Statistics, January – June, 2012





Question: I would like to eat more locally grown produce. How can I find out if there are any farmers' markets close to where I live?

Answer: Local Harvest (<u>www.localharvest.org</u>) is a great resource. You can search for farms and farmers' markets in your area, as well as restaurants and grocery stores that sell locally grown meats, produce, and dairy products. You can search by location or by product type. According to the Local Harvest website, there are 19 farmers'

markets and 16 farms in the metro Atlanta area. One of them, FreshRoots Farm (www.freshrootsfarm.com), is less than a mile from the northwest corner of campus! Visitors and volunteers are welcome.
