



- Strengthens links of economic opportunity
- Positive treatment of park environment
- Heightens use of Vine City MARTA Station


- Resistance of GWCC and Falcons to comprehensive solutions
- Lack of will at City to assist on a community-serving program and design
- Resistance of design team to make stadium accommodate MLK continuity



Comprehensive Stormwater Management at the Gulch Overview

- Gulch: 267-Acre sub-watershed
 - Contains Dome, GWCC, NSP, MMPT
 - Over 80% Impervious
 - Major Source of flooding in VC/EA
- Comprehensive Stormwater Management Plan:
 - **Retrofit Existing Buildings**
 - Cisterns for capture/reuse
 - Green Infrastructure


Comprehensive Stormwater Management at the Gulch Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Major new development projects (NSP, MMPT) provide opportunity for implementation
- Minimizes impact of flooding on residential neighborhoods and related health effects
- Provides "green jobs" and construction jobs
- Clear, measurable goals
- Sets new precedent for addressing stormwater comprehensively at subbasin level

- Requires cooperation and coordination across multiple agencies and property owners
- Potentially prohibitively expensive, no clear funding source identified
- Long-term timeframe for implementation
- Lack of regulatory authority





Mims Park | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Flooding alleviation will make parkside development feasible
- Aligning housing development with greenspace addresses equity issues
- Potential green jobs supported by a workforce development program
- Increased access to recreation opportunities and improved mental health

- New park space will require maintenance and security, requiring additional financial resources
- New parks could attract development too quickly, pricing existing residents out of the area


Mims Park | Timeline


Targeted Reinvestment | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Maximize impact of limited resources
- Funds from different sources can be leveraged
- Visual impact of investment will attract residents and resources
- Investment will reduce crime, increase safety, and improve mental health
- Housing rehab and infrastructure improvements will improve equity

- Limits areas that receive support initially
- No unified community coalition
- Financial resources are limited


Expansion of Land Trust | Overview

Community Land Trusts are often focused on for their affordable housing component, but they can also offer opportunities to

- Provide permanent environmental conservation
- Place interim uses on the property, such as urban agriculture
- Provide opportunities for affordable business development
- Assemble vacant property for future development



Land trusts can take donated tax-delinquent properties and purchase land/houses from Fulton County Land Bank to make land use choices on a case by case basis

Expansion of Land Trust | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Flexibility in land use choices
- Active land trust already exists
- Increase safety through maintenance and upkeep
- Permanent housing affordability addresses equity issues
- Stormwater and flooding management
- Increased access to amenities improves mental health and provides recreation opportunities

- Requires ongoing organizational structure
- Funding for increased technical assistance and property acquisition
- Maintenance and monitoring required for public safety
- Perceived complicated structure







STRENGTHS


- Feeds graduates of the workforce development program into construction and local businesses/anchor institutions
- Connects strengths and needs of anchor institutions with workforce training and business development
- Easy access to jobs for neighborhood residents improves equity
- Multiple possibilities for resource centers
 - English Avenue School
 - E.R. Carter School
 - Kennedy Middle School
 - Bethune Elementary School
 - Morris Brown College
 - GWCC
- Local entrepreneurship development
- Increases social capital through alliance network and local opportunities


- Potential difficulty gaining full commitment from anchor institutions
- Requires time and staff investment
- Aligning resource services with appropriate locations may be difficult
- Other activities to ensure job training/business development would still need to be occurring in the near term
- Jobs created from local businesses are potentially unstable


Civil Rights Tourism Extension | Strengths & Challenges

- No entity currently pursuing heritage tourism on the Westside



Martin Luther King Jr. Revitalization | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Bring offices and employees to MLK retail opportunity
- Connect civil rights legacy and provide access for potential clientele from King's boyhood to adulthood home
- Business accelerator employment opportunity for AUC students
- Improve connectivity between Westside neighborhoods and Downtown
- Loosen dividing nature of MLK
- Manage game day travel demand
- Provide better transit access
- Encourage physical activity and increase safety

- Difficult to relocate offices without commitment from anchor groups such as the Falcons
- Need to ensure that economy will support development along MLK
- Possible right-of-way limitations. Need to ensure that traffic impacts will be tolerable
- Need to ensure that transit ridership levels will be sufficient and consistent

The dedication of a small percentage of city and stadium parking revenue collected around the new stadium to go to streetscape improvement and maintenance.









Parking Benefits Program | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Funding for streetscape improvements
- Reinvestment in communities surrounding the stadium
- Increase safety and encourage physical activity through pedestrian infrastructure improvements

- Opportunity cost of other uses of parking revenue
- Sponsors favor surface parking over parking deck
- Discourage redevelopment of current parking lots





Consolidated Education Outreach | Strengths & Challenges

STRENGTHS

- Connectivity between organizations
- Capacity building through combining resources
- Ability to scale up programs
- Improved overall property value because of school performance
- Potential to expand curriculum: e.g. ecological learning
- Improved education leads to positive health outcomes by increasing equity and access
- Increase in social capital through network building

- Coordination between various organizations
- Administrative capacity requirements
- Sustaining power of student organizations
- No secure revenue stream
