The Greenville Spartanburg International Airport is in the midst of a major facelift and is ramping up efforts to attract new distribution and logistics facilities to the land it owns around its terminals and runways. This timing meshes well with the opening of the South Carolina Ports Authority Inland Port which will attract cargo from across the Southeast and improve the efficiency of shipping from the Upstate through the Port of Charleston. The Inland Port, set to open at about the same time this conference takes place, will be a powerful economic generator. Representatives from these economic powerhouses will discuss local and regional impacts (past and anticipated) and future plans. The session will include a bus trip to the area to view the sites.

The Healthy Comprehensive Planning South *Carolina* project, led by Eat Smart, Move More South Carolina and the South Carolina Department of Health and Environmental Control, analyzed the current state of health policy in comprehensive plans in South Carolina and developed a toolkit to help planners and public health officials incorporate public health policy into future comprehensive plans. The process and toolkit will be presented in this session.

The Value of History: Recognizing, Preserving, and Promoting Your Historic Assets *(Heritage A)* (1.25 CM*)

It is a fact that preserving historic assets has a positive impact on local tourism because visitors seek out great places with special character. Historic Tax Incentives for Redevelopment (Heritage D) (1.25 CM*)

In the current economy, any assistance in meeting the bottom line can help make or break the projects that build our communities. An attorney who specializes in economic development incentives will share information about federal and state tax incentive legislation and how planners can access them to help bring redevelopment projects to reality. Fee in Lieu of Tax, Special Source Revenue Credits, Historic Tax Credits (federal and state), the Bailey Bill, Textile Revitalization Credits, Abandoned Building Credits and other incentives that can make redevelopment projects viable will be discussed.

Past, Present, and Future of the Palmetto Trail: Evolution of a Statewide Trail (Heritage A) (1.25 CM*)

The Palmetto Trail is both a vision and reality for South Carolina. The vision is to create a trail connecting the mountains to the, with two-thirds of the trail already complete. The Palmetto Conservation Foundation has been the steward of the trail and is working toward completing the trail with an ambitious master plan. The session will cover how the trail came to be, how it is managed today, and how it will be completed in the coming years.

Atlanta to Charlotte High Speed Rail (Heritage B) (1.25 CM*)

Under the guidance of the Georgia Department of Transportation, feasibility of one leg of this project is being examined – the connection between Atlanta, GA and Charlotte, NC through the state of South Carolina. This session will provide details of the ongoing study and the possibility of a future high speed rail system in the Southeast.

Preserving, Revitalizing, and Modernizing (Heritage C) (1.25 CM*)

Both theoretical and practical methods of historic preservation and neighborhood revitalization will be explored in this session. Community Development: Shaping Our Communities (Heritage D) (1.25 CM*)

Vibrant, stable communities are vital for building strong local economies. Community Development agencies are shaping and revitalizing communities with Community Development Block Grant funds and other programs by providing housing and community facilities, establishing partnerships, and crafting opportunities for creative financing of needed community assets. Community Development professionals will share knowledge gained from successful developments like Brutontown in Greenville County, an affordable community of 80 new bungalow and craftsman style homes complete with a bustling community center. Also, multiple financing tools, including CDBG funds, were used to rehabilitate the 1912 Oakland Mills in Newberry, SC which is now used for residential space for Newberry College students and non-student apartments. The City of Greenville will share successful strategies used by the City to engage residents in the planning process and to utilize its CDBG funding to carry out their vision to create healthy and vibrant neighborhoods.

A Tourism Action Plan and Its Implementation – Growing an Economic Sector in Spartanburg County (Heritage A) (1.25 CM*)

Rivers abound in South Carolina and Spartanburg County is blessed with scenic urban waters that have been largely undisturbed by development. At the beautiful Glendale Shoals, representatives of the Tyger River Foundation, the Palmetto Conservation Foundation, and Wofford College will share with planners their successes and pitfalls in making blueways/paddling trails on the Tyger River, the Pacolet River, and the Lawson's Fork Creek a reality. This presentation will include: the partnerships that make it work, gaining river access, branding, signage, how to locate put in/take outs and portage paths and obtaining proper easements, and river safety. Each presenter will include points of interest on the Rivers such as the 1780 Anderson Mill (obtained by the Tyger River Foundation), the Glendale Outdoor Leadership School (founded by the Palmetto Conservation Foundation) that enhance the experience. These blueways bring eco-tourists to the County and
